


LUNAR NEW YEAR Literacy Resources

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

The Lunar New Year is celebrated throughout Asia in late January or early February based on the lunar cycle. In China, this holiday is known as the Chinese New Year. Although "Chinese New Year" is a more common term outside of Asia, I've decided to use "Lunar New Year" in these activities to make them as inclusive as possible. If this wording is confusing to your students, explain that the Chinese New Year is called the Lunar New Year in many parts of the world. You can use these activities in cooperative learning teams, with pairs of students, or in guided reading groups.

1. Comparing New Years Venn Diagram


This activity contains fact cards with details about the Lunar and American New Years, and students take turns sorting them onto a Venn Diagram. To prepare your students for this activity, read aloud a nonfiction book such as Chinese New Year for Kids or Lunar New Year. If you can't find an appropriate book, have them research facts about the Lunar New Year. Another options is to use the activity BEFORE you read the book and ask your students to guess where the fact cards should be placed. After they finish, read the book aloud or ask them to research facts about the Lunar New Year on their own to check their answers.




2. Sam and the Lucky Money Discussion Cards

Use these discussion cards after reading <u>Sam and the Lucky Money</u> aloud to your students. This is a touching story that incorporates a Lunar New year tradition and includes a wonderful message about what it means to be lucky. 

Why don't you think Sam was hungry after he entered the bakery?


How did Sam feel at the toy store? (How did his feelings change while he was there?)

American and Lunar New Years Facts

People celebrate with cheering and loud noise.	The calendar year is based on the solar (sun) cycle.
The calendar year is based on the lunar (moon) cycle.	The first day of the new year is always January 1st.
The first day of the new year is different each year.	The years are named after 12 different animals.
People make new year resolutions or promises.	Everyone in the country turns a year older on the same day.
Children receive red envelopes with "good luck" money.	Black—eyed peas are served on New Years Day for good luck.
The new year is started by cleaning house to sweep out bad luck.	People celebrate with parades and fireworks.
People spend time with family and friends.	People sing "Auld Lang Syne" at midnight.
Baby symbolizes new year and new beginnings.	At midnight families pray to ancestors for a good year and then enjoy a fancy dinner.
